

Approximately 1,700 s.f. of retaining wall will be rebuilt in order to stabilize a parking lot in the area. Five thousand six hundred l.f. of sidewalk will be replaced along West Church, Blaine and Garden Streets. Renovations to the brick surface of Holmes Street will be made as well as replacing 978 l.f. of curbing. The roof on the neighborhood recreation center will be replaced. The five hundred residents of the LODO neighborhood will benefit from this project. The area is 60% low- and moderate-income. The city has committed \$60,000 from its Allocation grant to this project.
